President's Column

I'm pleased to report that PAST has had an active and successful year. As you know, we worked long and hard with the city on the renovation plans for the College Terrace Library. The library is closing for construction as we go to press. While PAST will not be holding a covenant for this property, we are satisfied that this building's status as one of our newest Category 2 historic structures gives us adequate recourse to appeal to the Historic Resources Board or City Council if we see anything untoward happening during the renovation process. I feel personally that the many hours we sat at the table with Public Works and the architects during the planning and design process helped produce a set of construction documents that address PAST's concerns for this community landmark.

Thanks to Natalie Loukianoff, Margaret Feuer, Janet Peacock, and Carolyn George for their work on Preservation Week activities. Our researchers identified over 30 one-hundred year-old houses in Palo Alto, and 15 on the Stanford Campus. It was gratifying to see how many families attended the Preservation Month ceremony to acknowledge their home's birthday.

We have made progress in solidifying our intention to hold covenants for private property owners who don't wish to see their beloved homes demolished once they sell, and hope to have an announcement in our next newsletter.

We continue to work with the Friends of Juana Briones in their effort to preserve Juana's residence on Old Adobe Road. The owners have appealed the decision not to let them demolish this special structure, and the Friends' attorney, Susan Brandt-Hawley, has submitted her response. A decision should be rendered by the end of the year. In the meantime, we continue to request that the city enforce its own laws against letting a building go to rack and ruin while the process continues.

Scott Smithwick spearheaded our efforts to preserve the view of Palo Alto High School's Haymarket Theater from Embarcadero Road, thus leaving the most historic portions of the school visible as an important gateway into the northern part of Palo Alto.

I would also like to recognize Scott for his efforts as PAST's newsletter editor for the last three years. He is stepping down from that role, but will continue on the board as a member of our Advocacy committee. Heartfelt thanks for a job well done!!

Our Holiday House Tour in December should be a real treat. Leslie McLaren has been delving into the mysteries of the Stedman name so familiar in architectural and real estate circles in Palo Alto. How were Morgan, Marcus, and James related, if at all? What did they build, when and where? We will explain it all! This will be a "not to be missed" tour, so save the date: December 13, 1-4 PM.



Residential Preservation Award 1013 Ramona

Presented to Theresa and Mark Rowland in recognition of their dedication to the preservation of their 1907 home at 1013 Ramona Street. This sensitive renovation preserves many of the home's historic features, including the narrow lapped siding, which had been hidden under stucco for many years, and contributes admirably to the character of the Professorville Historic District.


Commercial Preservation Award


Sunset Magazine and its Influence on California Architecture
